LETTERS OF SUPPORT

Letters of support are evidence the offender will have a network of friends and family to love, help and support them when they are released.

THEY SHOW:

- 1. Someone who knows the individual and cares.
- 2. That he has a support group waiting for him.
- 3. This support group can be family, friends, and community.
- 4. The good side of the inmate, which helps offset the negative criminal record.

WHO WRITES SUPPORT LETTERS:

- 1. Family members, friends and loved ones
- 2. Members of the community such as neighbors, co-workers, church members and ministers.
- 3. People who may not necessarily know the offender, but know the family of the offender and would like to offer support while the individual readjusts into the community.
- 4. People with influence in the community who are willing to write offering their support for the offender based on their position in the community.

WHAT TO SAY IN THE LETTERS:

- 1. State offender name and inmate number (if applicable).
- 2. State your name, address and phone number.
- 3. State your relationship with the offender and the length of time you have known them.
- 4. Your belief that despite the offender's bad choices they are a good person and the reason you feel this way.
- 5. Your belief that the individual will not re-offend.
- 6. Your willingness to support the offender by offering advice, encouragement and helping them readjust to the community.
